On The Air

AYBERRY MOURNS the recent passing of "Sheriff Andy" who managed to keep order in his community without the need to carry a gun. When I was a little kid, I enjoyed watching the antics of the locals on the program, especially those of Andy's egotistical sidekick deputy, Barney Fife, and the town's puffed-up Mayor. A recurring theme was for high and mighty characters to end up being fed a heaping helping of humble pie.

50 years later, we can still learn from the gentle lessons Andy and Barney taught us about leading and serving others. It's not a big jump from town sheriff to club officer, and in any club you can see all types of leadership styles.

Please note that what I am about to write is not "aimed at" any particular person or group. nor have I ever witnessed any of this in any club, anywhere-rather it is presented as helpful advice to the wise. I make no claim to having all the answers; I hope to present ideas to think about which can direct us all to being better club leaders.

I've heard it said that good leaders are "trusted servants-they do not govern." Ours is a democratic society, and that means the people rule themselves by reaching agreements on how best to carry out their work. American democracy came into being as the result of people's objections to being ruled by distant kings who had no regard for the people's wishes or well-being.

This is the starting-point for all good leaders: The will of the people is superior to the will of the leader. We are not kings. Rather we should strive to be "trusted servants."

In 21st century America, it seems that many people are looking for someone to do their thinking for them. Our society has given away many of our rights to think and work independently, only to have those rights grabbed up by those who would harm us while increasing their own fortunes.

Just as many fat-cat politicians have been finding themselves voted out of office, the same is true for club officers who "make all the decisions," or railroad their own personal agendas with utter disregard for the wants and needs of those members they were elected to serve.

Both sides share the blame here, and both sides lose more than they gain. The members rightly feel that they have little say in club business. The leaders may believe they are "rescuing" the members from themselves.

The best approach is to remember that leaders, while often elected for their vision of the future, have a responsibility to work with all their members to shape that future. The wise leader will use the soft sell to get members to buy into his ideas, and will sometimes let go of the reins of power rather than shove his ideas down people's throats with force.

Americans don't much care for dictators. We fought large, costly wars to put such "leaders" in their places, and "brought them to justice."

Most clubs conduct their business meetings following a few simple rules of organization. The most widely recognized set of operational rules is Roberts Rules of Order, and lays out a time-tested and widely-known system for efficient and orderly conduct of meetings.

Many club officers have never taken the time to brush up on Robert's Rules. That's too bad, because almost everything you need to know to manage a club effectively is contained in

that book.

Let's see what a savvy club officer can learn from those pages...

> Every action must be made as a motion by a member at a meeting,

then seconded by another member, then discussed by the members at the meeting, then voted on by those members.

- The president does not make motions.
- The president regulates discussion, calls for votes and conducts meetings.
 - He's more like the traffic cop directing traffic, than like the driver of a car on the road—his job is to maintain orderly flow.
- The board of officers does not "do business" for the club-they only carry out what the members have moved. seconded and voted on at a meeting.
- Officers should meet in secret as little as possible, lest the members become suspicious of their intentions.
- At <u>all</u> times, it's best for officers to work for the members in an open and transparent manner. Remember-the officers are directly responsible to those they serve.

Let's all practice great leadership by setting good examples, and by being open, honest and accountable to the members we serve. And members, please attend and participate in your club's meetings instead of staying away and griping about the officers. Let's make Sheriff Andy proud!

NBEMS at July Meeting

EMBERS AND guests of the Cambria Radio Club (CRC) met with Harry Bloomberg, W3YJ, for a NBEMS training session on Saturday, July 21, 2013 at the Mount Calvary Lutheran Church in Johnstown. The scene was almost right out a Halloween film. The room was dimed to allow viewing of the excellent projected slides that Harry uses in his talks. Each participant was balancing a lap top computer and a 2 meter hand held. The glow from each screen was eerie. And ten lap top speakers echoed the musical notes of MT63 digital communications. It could easily have been Halloween.



Harry began with a very interesting discussion of the background of message handling and the development of the needs of our customers. Public services such as the Red Cross and other agencies really benefit from the nitch amateur radio fills when communications infrastructures are over

stressed or fail.

Next Harry demonstrated message handling with the recently upgraded flmsg program. Streamlined management of ICS and other forms is now released. The most impressive upgrade is greatly improved operating ease and streamlining of spread sheet (CSV formatted) files. Our served agencies are finding more and more need to communicate data in spread sheet form. After conversion of a spread sheet to a comma delimited, CSV, form the number of steps to transmit the files has been reduced and simplified. This is a major improvement for us as operators.

Every one received one-on-one help in setting up NBEMS software and with addressing any problems in the use of the software. Everyone tested their gear and software by sending a message to Harry and then receiving the message back. Many thanks to Harry for an excellent training.

Harry's presentation slides are found on the www.wpaares.org website. Look at the NBEMS – Training tab. On the ARES website there are also tutorials on advanced NBEMS and very useful computer configurations which allow simultaneous NBEMS sessions on HF and VHF and other topics. One can also find very helpful video tutorials on YOUTUBE.

Harry encouraged us to join ARES and to



practice using the software for our general ham radio activities. He noted that constant use really keeps us sharp and familiar with the software. Preparedness is a prime factor in emergency service. Think a 1977 Johnstown Flood scenario. Suddenly the telephone switching gear is under water and out of service. Police, Fire and Utilities are forced to communicate using vehicle-tovehicle radios as lightening and high winds have taken repeaters out of service. The operative phrase is "out of service". However, the amateur services feature flexibility and many modes and frequencies to fill the gaps. In an emergency if amateurs are called on by our served agencies we can provide communications using phone, digital and CW modes. We can provide support using ICS,

> Red Cross and other message formats that are familiar to the served agencies. And, we can deploy rapidly.

The instruction in the installation and use of the NBEMS software was outstanding. Harry is an excellent instructor. He emphasized a number of important facets of the program suite. The best part of the NBEMS suite of software is that it is FREE! Simply go to http://www.w1hkj. com/Fldigi.html and select Download at: download page. Download the fldigi and flmsg software for your operating

system and perform the install. To use fldigi one can simply hold a hand held or microphone and speaker or head set close to the computer mic and speaker.

Known as acoustic coupling it works and works well. One can also build or purchase a

system such as the SignalLink® or one of the West Mountain units to connect the radio and computer. Complete detailed instructions in setup and use of fldigi and flmsg are found on the WPA ARES web site. Select the tab labeled NBEMS – Training and everything you ever wanted to know about this digital program suite is ready to view and download. There are many other features included in the suite. There are lots of modes from MT63 and Olivia to RTTY and CW. Lots of message forms from ICS to National Traffic System. There is contest logging with duplicate checking.

Again, many thanks to W3YJ for an excellent training class. You may like to check into the ARES NBEMS training net which is conducted by Harry on the W3YJ repeater at 8:00 PM each Sunday evening. That is the 443.450 (100) repeater in Pittsburgh. One can also check in on Echolink. Search for the W3YJ repeater and connect.

A Low-Cost Portable Mast

DUBLIC SERVICE activities are picking up, and it's often necessary to put up a temporary antenna quickly and easily, without breaking the bank.

Putting on the old thinking cap, and suffering the slings and arrows of outrageous trial-anderror (mostly error!), I came up with an inexpensive, reliable and easy-to-use antenna mounting system which fills the bill. Meeting my usual design criteria, it's constructed of inexpensive parts available off the shelf from your local hardware and discount stores, provides the flexibility to mount a number of different kinds of antennas, and sets up and breaks down in seconds, to a compact size that fits in most vehicles with room to spare.

Parts List

OU CAN PURCHASE all the parts at a hardware store for under \$50, and if you shop around for bargains and sales you can build it for much less! The most expensive part is the 6-12 foot telescoping painter pole. I found a heavy-duty pole at Trader Jack's for \$23.95, and lighter-duty models are as cheap as \$9.95, but they are not recommended for any but the lightest antennas.

Construction

ASTE NOT, want not. That was good advice that served our forebears well. Careful attention to accurate measurements is important because all the pipe will be used. There's no room for error!

First, cut 1-3/8" off the end of each pipe. You will assemble the three "Wye" connectors using these two rings, such that you can see through it, and the 45° legs are pointing to the other end. Then swivel the wye connectors so each leg is 120° from the other two. Set this "spider" assembly aside.

Cut the longer of the two pipes 51-3/8 inches from one end. This will result in a 51-1/4 inch piece and a 67-1/4 inch piece, plus or minus a quarter inch depending on your cutting tool. (A coarse saw cuts a larger "kerf," making the resulting pipes shorter.)

Fit the pieces into the 45° legs of the spider, with the longest piece in the "top" wye (the one away from the end the 45° legs point toward,) the medium piece in the middle wye, and the shortest piece into the bottom wye.



Set-up

IRST, MAKE SURE you will set up in a level area that is clear of power lines and other hazards. If you are setting up in a public place, pick a

location off the beaten path, to minimize the hazards to "civilians." Ask yourself what the antenna would hit if it fell over. If the answer



isn't "Nothing," find a better location!

Set the whole thing on the ground, and make sure it's assembled tight enough to stand on its own. Drop the painter pole through the center of the spider, handle end first, and make sure everything is leveled up.

You are now ready to put your favorite antenna on top of the painter pole. Most commercial antennas with U-bolts will mount with no problems. The largest antenna you should use is one that weighs less than 20 lbs., and is no longer than 6 feet. On windy days, you should secure the bottom of the painter pole so it can't slide across the ground. A cement block is ideal for this purpose.

If you want to tape the feedline to the pole, the blue or green "painter" masking tape is best—it's easy to remove and reapply, and doesn't leave sticky goo all over the place like electrical tape does. For directional antennas, a couple loops of painter tape will secure the mast to the spider and keep the antenna pointed in the desired direction. An inexpensive, reliable and easy-touse antenna mounting system!

In Use

UAD-COUNTY members and I have been giving my prototype a real workout this summer, and the results have been very satisfactory at fairs, Field Day, VHF contests, hilltopping, camping and at our monthly antenna test range on the Penn State DuBois Campus.

It hasn't let us down yet, and setting it up is sure and quick.

There's been some debate about whether or not the spider should be glued together or not. Currently, the prototype is not glued at all, and seems to be sufficiently sturdy, but sometimes comes apart during assembly when least expected. Surprisingly, the painter pole keeps the pieces from moving more than an inch or so, and the entire assembly remains stable.

I can't see any harm in cementing the spider together, as long as pains are taken to make sure the legs are spread at exactly 120° while gluing. Any mistake would result in having to buy more wyes and pipe. Alternatively, if you glued the rings only on the end that goes into the top of a wye, you would gain more stability but would retain the ability to completely disassemble the spider for easier portability.

For HF use, I use a couple "Hamsticks" for the desired band, with an MFJ Model MFJ-347 Dipole

Mount. It attaches securely to the top of the painter pole, and allows you to attach a pair of hamstick-style antennas for the band you're using. List price is \$19.95, but they can be

found for around \$13.95 online.

Fiberglass mobile whips can be had for around \$15 each, and you will need two for

each band. This adds up quickly, so if money is an issue you need to choose wisely.

Forget 160, 80 and 40 meters! A 16-foot antenna 12 feet in the air on those bands is

only slightly better than a dummy load. You'll have better luck on 20, 17 and 15 meters.

If I could only afford one band, I'd start with

20 meters, since it is very popular for special event operations, and DX is relatively easy to work during public demonstrations.

Most of the time, your field operations will need to have a good VHF/UHF connection to a repeater, or to the command post in an emergency response. This system will easily and safely support vertical or horizontal high-gain antennas up to 6 feet. Antennas of this size, at 12 feet above ground will meet most of your communication needs quite well.

With its low cost, simple assembly and readily-available parts list, this system merits a place in every emergency communicator's "go-kit." Make a copy of the plans, too, because in a disaster area, you may need to make one or more to meet the needs of the response teams.

Because it uses off-the-shelf items available at every hardware store, this system is ideal for field construction in a disaster-stricken area. Its low cost means that you're not out a small fortune if it is damaged or destroyed (or blows away!) during the operation.

Every time we've set this up, we've heard encouraging remarks along the lines of, "Isn't that neat!" It's just one of those good ideas that simply

works effectively and isn't expensive. Once you've built one, you'll just keep finding uses for it. Sort of like the wheel, it just keeps rolling along! We've been giving the prototype a real workout this summer!

ECARA Antenna Party.

N JULY 3RD, members of the Elk County Amateur Radio Association held a repeater antenna party at the Boot Jack hill radio site. The location has a 100 foot cedar pole with guy wires. Last fall the club was given access

to the site and managed to install the repeater antenna about half way up before bad weather set in. A 120 foot length of $\frac{1}{2}$ inch hardline was coiled up at the bottom and connected to the repeater. This installation gave excellent service through out the winter.

The top of the pole has a pair of low band yagi antennas that were used by the previous site tenant. These are too large and heavy to be removed without a crane so a local crane service has been contacted. We decided notto wait for the crane and installed the Antenna Specialist antenna above them. The antenna was removed from the side of the pole and lowered to the ground where the crew realigned the 4 dipoles at 90 degrees around the 20 foot long support mast. At the same

time the $\frac{1}{2}$ inch feedline was lowered to the ground and uncoiled.

After installing mast clamps to the existing support pipe at the top of the pole the antenna was raised and installed. Then the feedline was pulled up and connected to the antenna and the connection was waterproofed. The pole has pole steps about every 3 feet so the feedline was tied off to them at about 10 foot intervals. Finally, the feedline was pushed through the entrance conduit in the building wall and reconnected to the repeater.

While the antenna work was in progress a backup Station Master antenna was hooked up to the repeater to maintain service. The Station Master is also available for emergency simplex communications needs or casual operating from the site.

The new antenna location is now in use on the ECARA Sunday evening net on N3NIA 147.00 MHz , no PL, 600 KHz positive offset at 8 PM.
